You'd expect to find some of the world's best chocolatiers in Westminster; this route helps you to choose your favourites. Expect to spend a pound or two in each shop.

Start this circular anti-clockwise ride wherever is most convenient – we've chosen to start in Hyde Park. All the shops are open between 10am-6pm Monday to Saturday and noon - 4.30pm on Sunday afternoon.

This flagship store includes a Moorish courtyard oasis, while a glass window in the shop floor lets you spy on the kitchen. Chantal Coady OBE, who founded Rococo in 1983, is the author of several books on chocolate. Look out for fair-trade, organic chocolate from Grococo, their farm in Grenada.

Their shop has always been in Bond Street, currently in the elegant Royal Arcade. Their Pink Marc de Champagne Truffles are popular with customers.


